
VILLAGE OF LANCASTER TREE EQUITY AND EDUCATION INITIATIVE

This exciting project is funded by a \$255,584 federal subaward grant from the USDA Forest Service, facilitated by American Forests. The project's purpose is to increase tree canopy cover within the Village of Lancaster, creating a healthier and more sustainable environment for residents. This grant will fund consultants, trees, planting materials, tools, and educational materials.

Trees will be planted in pre-selected areas between the sidewalk and the curb in the municipal right of way. The project will focus on planting and maintaining trees in four neighborhoods within the village.

Neighborhoods were selected for tree planting based on a detailed assessment of the current tree planting efforts and environmental risks within the community.

Residents will be notified via mail if a tree is planned to be planted near your house. The notification will include details such as the type of tree and the expected planting date. This ensures that residents are informed before the planting takes place. The first planting season will be Spring 2025, and planting will take place in the fall and spring seasons over the next several years.

DPW ADVANCES ENERGY EFFICIENCY WITH COMPLETE LED LIGHTING UPGRADE THROUGH CLEAN ENERGY GRANT

The Department of Public Works is upgrading municipal lighting systems at the DPW Buildings to energy-efficient LED technology, with the goal of significantly reducing energy consumption, greenhouse gas emissions, and energy costs. Funded by a \$10,000 grant from the Clean Energy Communities Project and selected based on an NYSERDA energy study, this initiative will complete the interior and exterior lighting conversion. The DPW building will have 100% LED lights by the end of the year.

Lancaster Fire Department 2024 Winter and Holiday Safety Tips:



During the holiday season your Lancaster Fire Department sees an uptick in the variety of fire calls that we respond to. As we approach the upcoming season, we would like to share some safety reminders to ensure that your festivities stay merry and bright so that you can safely deck the halls this holiday season.



Having fire extinguishers – and knowing how to use them – is an important part of maintaining a safe home for you and your family. In an emergency, using a fire extinguisher can be frightening, especially if you're unfamiliar with the process. There is an acronym, **P.A.S.S.**, to help you remember the four simple steps: Pull, Aim,
 Squeeze, and Sweep.

- Test your carbon monoxide alarms and smoke detectors at least once a month.
- Have a qualified professional clean and inspect your furnace, vents and chimney every year.
- Keep anything that can burn, including your Christmas tree, at least 3 feet from any heat source like fireplaces, wood stoves, radiators, space heaters, heat vents or candles.
- Remember to check your holiday light strings for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires, or loose connections, and throw out damaged sets. Also, avoid plugging too many lights into an outlet; overloaded circuits can overheat and cause an electrical fire.
- Entrances to your residence or business should be kept clear of snow and ice for responding emergency personnel.



Pull the safety pin.



Aim the hose or nozzle of the extinguisher at the base of the fire for the most effectiveness.



Squeeze the trigger evenly to maximize the extinguisher's effectiveness.



Sweep the hose or nozzle in a back-andforth movement across the fire's base.

• The Village of Lancaster received responses to a Request for Proposals and will be deciding on the consulting and engineering firms for the Pocket Park Project and the Small Project Fund.






Winter is coming: Here are some reminders while clearing snow



- Village Plow Operators are required to obtain a plowing permit, pursuant to Village Code § 279-3.
- All Public Sidewalks shall be cleared after each snowfall.
- Storages piles should be kept out of right of ways and away from any storm drain inlets or swales.
- Plowing across any road is prohibited.
- Citations may result by not following guidelines that protect safe pedestrian and vehicle traffic.

175th Events




